This half term, our learning theme has been 'Sensational Senses' and we have been finding out about the main parts of the human body, learning how we change as we grow older and exploring the five senses.

"I liked learning about the different parts of our body. I used to get confused but now I know 'shoulder', 'elbow', 'wrist' and 'ankle'!" Joseph "I liked naming all the different senses and the parts of the body that go with each one." Henry We have also carried out a range of practical science experiments. One of our favourites was a taste test experiment to see how our tongues taste bitter, sour, salty and sweet flavours. Some of us pulled some very funny faces during this investigation!





In Literacy, we have enjoyed reading 'Funnybones' by Janet and Allan Ahlberg and we then had fun writing our own 'Funnybones' stories. We tried to sequence events using time adverbs and to add some adjectives to give more description. Here are some extracts from our stories:

"When they got to the park, they opened the green gate and saw a fluffy dog that was sad and hurt." Edie "Suddenly, they spotted a dizzy bird. The big skeleton scratched his hard skull and said, "What is that?" "It's a gigantic bird and it has hurt its big wing. Let's bring it to the kind vet!" said the worried skeleton." Logan "When they got down to Earth, they quickly got into the dark, spooky cellar. Big skeleton got the fire extinguisher and put the fire out on the mini baby star. Then they had a beautiful disco with the little star. There was chocolate cake, party hats and balloons." Joseph

We also had the chance to make our own 'Funnybones' skeletons.

"I enjoyed cutting out and sticking my skeleton. It was fun!" Alex

Following our story writing in Literacy, we have done a poetry unit. We have read different 'senses' poems together, identifying features such as how many lines and verses they have, whether they rhyme or not and whether they have any alliteration in them. We have also written our own 'Ears Hear', 'A Sense of Touch' and 'Colour' poems, based on the original poems we have read.

In History, we have learned about the lives of three significant nurses: Florence Nightingale, Mary Seacole and Edith Cavell. We have used a timeline to see when they lived and we have compared their lives as nurses, identifying what was similar and what was different in the experiences they had. Miss Davis-White brought in some of the plants that Mary Seacole used (including lemon, lemongrass, ginger, okra and aloe vera), so that we could see and smell them ourselves!

"Florence Nightingale was very important because she helped people who were injured. She used to take care of the soldiers at night as well as in the day. She was called 'the lady with the lamp'." Ellis

"Florence helped to make hospitals very clean and tidy so there were less germs." Joseph "Mary used plants to make people feel better." Artie

"Florence and Mary were both nurses who went to help soldiers fighting in Crimea." Martha

"Although Florence and Mary looked very different, they were both significant nurses."

In Maths, we have been practising counting in multiples of 2, 5 and 10. "I have got really good at counting in 2s because I keep doing it!" Martha "Counting in 5s is my favourite!" Rosie.

We have been introduced to 'arrays' and have learned how counting the number of rows and columns in an array can help us visualise multiplication.

In this picture, there are 4 columns with 2 doughnuts in each one. We can think of this as '4 lots of 2'. We have been learning how to describe arrays by writing repeated addition sentences (in this case '2 + 2 + 2 + 2 = 8') and multiplication sentences (in this case '4 x 2 = 8') to go with them. "I liked writing repeated addition sentences for arrays and then counting in multiples to work out the answers." Lyla

We have also spotted lots of real life arrays in chocolate bars, egg boxes and cupcake baking trays!
Can you find any more examples of arrays at home?



In PSHE we have been learning about the factors that help us to lead a healthy lifestyle, including: being active; eating a healthy, balanced diet; knowing how to recharge our batteries by sleeping well and spending time on mindfulness activities. "I liked it when we did the mindfulness colouring activity. It made me feel happy, calm and

relaxed." Bella

'Caring for Others' has been our RE unit over the last few weeks. It started with a wonderful visit from Divinder Kaur from the Siri Guru Singh Sabha Gurdwara in Crawley. Divinder came to tell us all about the Sikh practice of Langar. We found out that every Gurdwara (Sikh temple) has a community kitchen called a Langar kitchen in it. Every day at each Gurdwara, people from the Sikh community take it in turns to donate ingredients and to prepare, cook and serve a free vegetarian meal to anyone, of any faith, who would like it.

"No-one is excluded from the Langar meal. Everyone can eat it." Eli

"You don't have to be a Sikh to go to the Gurdwara and eat the Langar meal." Rosie

"The Langar meal is free and it's vegetarian so anyone can have it." Alex

"Sikhs believe that everyone should be treated equally and that it is important to be kind." Fleur

"The pots they use in the Langar kitchens are really big because they cook for so many people." Taitusi

We have also learned about how other religions show care to others.

"I liked learning about the story of the Good Samaritan. Jesus told this story to show everyone how to be kind to other people, even if they're not your friends." Henry



In PE this half term, we have had a brilliant time learning new tennis skills with Justin, from Chichester Racquets and Fitness Club.

Meanwhile, Mrs Dutton has been helping us to improve our running, sprinting and athletics skills.

"I really like running and practising my fast sprinting." Ellis

Our Science learning for this half term has been all about plants. We set up an experiment to see what plants need in order to grow successfully. We set up 5 identical plants – one had soil, water, sunlight and the right temperature, and the others each had one of these things missing. The results showed us just how important sunlight and water are for plants – without these, our plants quickly wilted and died.



In Art, we've learned about Vincent Van Gough. We were amazed to find out that he wasn't particularly successful while alive, and that his artwork only began to be popular some time later. We painted our own versions of his famous sunflower artwork.



During our Maths lessons, we've been learning to tell the time on an analogue clock. We've enjoyed using the 'mini clocks' to move the hands round and make the correct time. We're now able to tell the time to the nearest 5 minutes. Can you work out what time we've made here?



In Literacy, we looked at the poem 'At the Zoo' by William Makepeace Thackeray. We analysed the structure of the poem and noticed how it was laid out to make it rhyme. We then used this structure to make some rhyming poems of our own!

Then I saw a big giraffe who was really rather tall,


Then I saw a grey hippo cooling off in a pool.

Then I saw a lovely zebra – doing a great big poo! By Viola








In Computing this half term, Year 3 have been learning how to use crumble kits! No, it is nothing to do with baking, rather a crumble controller is an easy-to-use programmable device, ideal for physical computing in primary schools. It is capable of driving two motors. With 4 input / output terminals, children can connect LEDs, switches and other interesting add-ons.



Having programmed the crumble using the coder, the devices are connected to the PCs using a USB cable and the software is then passed on to run on the crumble.



In Science this half term, we have been investigating what plants need to be able to grow well. We got 6 fuschia plants, all looking very similar, all the same height.





## **English**

In addition, the children have also spent time revising the different elements of their grammar, punctuation and spelling learning through discrete lessons and several Kahoot quizzes!




## <u>Maths</u>

# YEAR 6 - WRITTEN BY THE CLASS

## Geography

The children have just started a new geography unit on plastic pollution, which first focuses on the history of plastic and the versatility of the material, but then looks at the environmental damage it causes to our local community as well as its global impact. The children will be visited by Carrie Cort from Sussex Green Living and the Final Straw Foundation later next half-term. Most importantly, the children will look at solutions to the plastic pollution problem and possibly come up with their own.

#### Art

The children have started their new art unit which is focused on printmaking. We've begun by looking at the history of printmaking, as well as the different printmaking styles. In our second lesson we have looked at tessellation and how to create different patterns, with the children exploring their own preferred printmaking styles after half term.



## **PE**

This term the children have participated in athletics and cricket. The children have concentrated on improving techniques in running (50m, 100m and 300m, 600m sprints), the vortex throw, the shot put throw, standing jump, long jump and triple jump events.

In addition, the children experienced a one-off session delivered by Chance to Shine for cricket and enjoyed a taster session for softball delivered by the Chichester Falcons Baseball & Softball club which was a big hit for many!






#### Tennis: The Road to Eastbourne - Bishop Luffa (08/05/24)



# For ages 6-8 and up Donut Feed the Squirrels


Norma and Belly really REALLY want a donut.
