


We have enjoyed an exciting trip to Dell Quay this half term, building on our Geography learning about coastlines and their geographical features. We loved getting to see these things up close for ourselves. We have also learned about a famous figure from History who was used to exploring coastlines herself - Mary Anning was a fossil hunter, who eventually discovered some incredible dinosaur bones.

We were treated to an exciting author visit in October, taking part in the Chichester Children's Bookfest. The fantastic author and illustrator Zehra Hicks joined the classes to share her book 'Panda and Penguin Find A Thing'. Every child wrote their own sequel to the book, and got a signed copy of Zehra's original to take home and keep. We love taking part in the Children's Bookfest each year, and know how special it is for every pupil to get a copy of the book directly from the authorit was lovely to see so many of them inspired by reading.

In Science, we've learned about different food groups, and what they provide the human body. We enjoyed thinking about our lunchtime meals, and working out what foods would be in each different section, and why they would be good for our bodies.





Our Literacy learning this half term has been focused on adjectives and adverbs, making sure we use these to improve our descriptive writing. We've got really good at including these in our work, and also spotting them in the books that we read!

What a fantastic start we have had to our first half term in Year 3. We have explored lots of exciting subjects, creating, learning and making lots of memories already. We can't wait to see what the next half term brings!

literacy, we have had some fantastic immersive lessons on creating descriptions. We have been focusing on an amazing book by Colin Thompson called, 'The Paradise Garden', all about a little boy who finds his mind wandering into a magical paradise garden. We decided to visit Bishop Palace Gardens to explore what a beautiful garden might look like and to listen out for both onomatopoeia words and to collect adjectives. We then returned to school to create illustrations of our paradise gardens in our sketch books before beginning to write our own descriptions. We are so proud of what we have created. What an amazing start we have had!







We have had lots of fun exploring our new book in our wholeclass reading lessons. We have loved looking at the illustrations in Arthur and the Golden Rope and learning all about Norse Mythology. Whilst we have been working through the story, the class have come up with some incredible ideas about what might happen next and have even spent breaktimes discussing the story with their peers and their teachers - amazing!








We have kicked off our DT learning by designing and creating our own purse/wallets. We started off by looking good examples some purses/wallets that we could buy in the shops. We then went on to design our own 'perfect wallet/purses'. We had to revisit some of our Year 2 skills, picking up a needle and thread and exploring sewing around different shapes. We then created our own stencils to help us to see how an item is constructed. We have finally finished sewing and adding details to our creations and as you can see, the children are so proud of themselves!

Year 3 have set off the year at a storming pace in Maths. We have been consolidating our knowledge of place value by using place value charts and lots of physical resources, such as place value counters and Diene's blocks (also known as Base 10). These help the children to physically manipulate the numbers, which often solidifies the knowledge better than simply looking at digits on paper. Plus, the children love using the resources!



We have now moved onto addition and subtraction methods, with children using a variety of methods to make sure that they can access calculations whatever learning style is. We use models, part-whole models, number lines and exchanging methods to secure our learning. If parents would like to learn more about these methods, please feel free to chat with the Year 3 teachers and we will be happy to demonstrate them for you.

In Science this term Year 3 have been learning all about light. We asked ourselves what light is, where sources of light come from and what types there are. We sorted light sources out into human-made and natural. Next, we learned how light travels in a straight line and that when light is blocked, it forms a shadow. We discovered that shadows can become larger or smaller, depending how close to the light the item in front of it is and that light rays can be bent in different ways. Then, last week, we learned all about how the light from our sun can help us, and also harm us, and how to protect ourselves. We did a fun experiment with painting suncream onto black card, to see what effect the suncream has on protecting the card from harmful UV rays. We are still watching the results reveal themselves day by day...

Sources of Light

In Geography & History have had great fun learning all about our fantastic city this term. We started by learning about where we live in relation to landmarks such as school and our local area. We mapped our routes to school and did some fabulous drawings of our own homes. Next, we looked at a variety of maps of Chichester and figured out where our school is in relation to the town centre. We looked at places of interest such as Chichester Cathedral, Novium Museum, Roman walls, Priory Park and the Market Cross.





Everyone really enjoyed learning about the history of Chichester and how the Romans built the original city. We were also amazed to find out that there used to be a motte and bailey castle in Priory Park!

We will hopefully be going on a walk around Chichester after half term, to see some of these fantastic monuments and buildings for ourselves, led by our wonderful governor, Mrs Abraham! Watch this space for further information!

This half term, our RE lessons have focussed on the rules within several religions. We looked at the Ten Commandments in Christianity, the 5 K's in Sikhism, Jewish food laws and the 5 Pillars of Islam. We discovered that these religions all have rules according to how they should be practised and that some of these laws are similar across different religions. We have compared some of the main rules and discussed their similarities and differences. Throughout our learning, we have found it incredibly interesting to discover lots of facts about several world religions and how people within those religions have rituals and beliefs which are common across the globe.

Our topic this term was called 'Make a Change!'. We have been learning about climate change, what has caused it and what countries are doing to help slow it down. We had a visit from Mrs Ritchie who is very passionate about our climate. She taught us about the carbon cycle and how the burning of fossil fuels, to make energy, has increased the carbon in our atmosphere and warmed our planet. After our discussions we made posters showing ways that we could all reduce our carbon footprint.








We have learnt about the biomes across the world and how climate change has affected the animals and plants that live in them. Making some endangered.

In science we have been learning about the names of the different animals groups. We used a Venn diagram and a branching tree to show how we could sort and identify individual animals. We made leaf posters to help us identify local leaves and we had great fun creating natural pictures using materials that we collected in our local area.







In art we have been learning about the colour wheel. We then used harmonious colours to paint a tree. They looked very effective. We are looking forward to designing and painting and eco picture to go on the front cover of our topic book.

In our literacy we have read a selection of eco poems. Some of us used their structure to write our own poem and others, were very creative, and wrote a poem of their own. All the poems made the reader think about climate change.



In maths we have been learning about place value and the estimated position of 4 digit numbers on a number line. We found learning to round numbers to the nearest 10,100 and 1,000 quite challenging and need some more learning.

We are very excited for two events in the last week of term.

On Tuesday we will be joining year 6 for an assembly and a class session about owls. The visitor is bringing real life owls for us to hold and watch fly. We will be learning about their habitats and why some of them are endangered.

Last but not least we have filled our jar full of pom poms and that means a treat! We are going to make indoor dens and have hot chocolate!. It is going to be great fun.

It has been a very busy term for year 5. We have been learning all about the Romans in Britain. Our learning has seen us dressed up as Romans, fighting off Barbarian Hoards (aka year 3 – thank you for helping us!) and visiting Fishbourne Roman Palace.









We have written Myths based on Romulus and Remus, developed our place value understanding in maths and been excellent, supportive teammates in Mrs Dutton's running challenge. All-in-all we have made a brilliant start to year 5!

Here are some of our recounts of our trip to Fishbourne. We wrote them to inform our reader (you) about our experience.

On Monday 6th October, year 5 visited Fishbourne Roman Palace to learn more about the Romans.

After a brisk, sunny walk we got to Fishbourne. We met a person who was going to start our tour, and he led us into a small room to watch a short film about the history of the original Palace.

Then, we went to a workshop with three ladies. We got into partners so we could do a Roman themed code cracking activity to open a mysterious box full of treasures. In the end, we guessed the code and got it first try! We chose a papyrus scroll and a beeswax candle from it. Finally, it was lunchtime! After we finished our packed lunches, we ran onto the mounds and played a fun game called Romans vs Celts, that we made up ourselves!

In the afternoon, we split into four groups to do some activities. Half of us went into the garden, which was the size of a football pitch, and the other half went into the museum to do a mosaic hunt and to look at the artifacts. Then, we swapped over. There also was a hands-on area where we could do Roman coin rubbings, puzzles and we could make our own mosaics with little squares. Lastly, we got our bags and left the Roman Palace.



Altogether, our Roman trip had been, as well as educational, very fun. Our two favourite facts were that in the Roman times the Fishbourne Roman Palace had been bigger than Buckingham Palace and had over one hundred rooms, and that the Romans had a plant called marshmallow and they used it as medicine for bruises and tumours.

This term, Year 6 have been exploring the fascinating world of the Maya. We've learned about where they lived and why their location helped them thrive, how religion influenced their lives, and the importance of food like cocoa and maize. We also discovered how we know about the Maya through explorers such as Diego de Landa and John Lloyd Stephens — and why we must be cautious when using historical sources. A visit from history expert Paul Ullson gave us the chance to handle real artefacts and deepen our understanding. Our learning culminated in a piece of writing where we took on the role of historians to reflect on everything we've discovered.





In science, we've been learning about living things and their habitats. We explored the Linnaean system and how it helps us classify animals in detail. We also investigated microorganisms, including harmful and helpful types. Currently, we're testing the best conditions for growing mould. Final results will be revealed after half-term.

In art, we've focused on creating different moods using watercolour techniques. Starting with tree sketches using pencils and pens, we then explored tints and shades. Inspired by The Lost Words, we've been scrapbooking and replicating its beautiful illustrations. We also had the exciting opportunity to meet and talk with a falconer, who brought owls to school and answered our questions. This experience helped inspire both our poetry and artwork.







In maths, we've revisited addition, subtraction, multiplication, and we're currently mastering long division! We've enjoyed practicing times tables with Hit the Button and solving Nrich investigations. We're on a mission to master arithmetic and have tackled lots of reasoning and problem-solving challenges.



In English, we've focused on writing portal story openers, using imaginative ideas and descriptive language. We've also made links to our Maya history, applying our knowledge across subjects. In our final week, we explored poems from The Lost Words, inspired by our art and our visit from the falconer.

In PE, we've been learning football and netball, developing skills in passing, shooting, dribbling, and understanding player positions. We've also taken part in cross country and enjoyed three squash sessions with England Squash coach Tim Vail. In our final week, we visited Chichester Racquets & Fitness Club and played on real squash courts — a fantastic experience!
