Hi Everyone,

I really enjoyed speaking with you all on the phone last week. You are doing an amazing job with your home learning and keeping to some routine which will help you to settle once we return to school. I hope that the suggestions in the last letter to support maths, writing and science learning have been useful. Don't worry if you haven't finished them all, they are a quide and outline of just some of the learning we would have been doing in school.

I can't believe two weeks have past and I am writing another set of learning suggestions! **Literacy**— These are some ideas for those children that have the story of James and the Giant Peach at home.

- Read the short description of Aunt Spiker and Aunt Sponge on page 5. Draw what you
 think they might look like. What clothes would they wear? Write your own description of
 them.
- Read chapter 3 and 4. How do you think James feels when he is given the bag from the old man? How do his feelings change when he drops them and they disappear into the ground?
- Chapter 6 Try to make a flip book that shows a peach growing bigger and bigger as you flip through the pages.
- Draw and paint a picture of the tree with an enormous peach hanging off one of the branches. Perhaps you could use collage for the peach to show a different texture?
- Look at the picture of the creatures inside the peach on page 34. What might each of the creatures say to James as he opens the door and sees them inside? What might James say back? Don't forget to use inverted commas to show what each creature says. Also, remember to start a new line for each new creature speaking.
- Perhaps look at making a minibeast creature using pom poms and pipe cleaners or scrunched up paper and papier mache.

With this letter I have sent a video clip (you can see how wild my hair is at the moment!)

Listen to the short clip of me introducing the book, 'Once Upon a Magic Book'. Look carefully at the cover page and try to spot as many different worlds as you can. The story is about two friends who find a magical key and purple book, in a toy shop. As soon as they open the book with the key, their magical adventure begins. Their first adventure is in the Fairytale Forest. In each scene the children have to find small objects hidden in the picture. Once they have found them they look for the red door. As they go through it, they find themselves in another world with more things to find and another the red door, hidden in the scene.

Your task is to draw a world for the children to explore. What objects are you going to hide in your picture and where will you hide the red door? Don't forget to include Jack and Sophie. You could paint your scene, use coloured pencils or you could add some collage materials?

Jack and Sophie step out into...

Use this sentence starter to describe the scene and tell the reader what they need to find before they can go through the red door. You might want to mention the witch who is chasing them for the key. Can we make a book of our own by putting all the scene pages together to share when we are back at school?

Reading—read something every day, vary your reading so that it includes fiction, non-fiction and comics. When you have finished a book write a short review about it for someone else.

Science—Plant Life Cycle -Draw the life cycle of a chosen seed eg bean, conker, tomato
