






By Year 1 pupils



We liked making our moving pictures in DT. Some children made rockets flying over the Earth and some made animals move across the forest. We drew it out first, before designing it.





We had a visitor. He was called The Wise Man. He told us all about the story of Jesus being born. We learned that there were no camels in the story and the Wise Men could have been teachers or stargazers. The Wise Man showed us how to draw some of the toys he brought in. Some of them were very old and made from wood and metal. Some were new toys made from plastic and had batteries.

We have been doing lots of writing. We watched the story of "The Clown" by Quentin Blake. We wrote sentences using time adverbs. We started by using 'In the beginning', 'One day' or 'Early one morning'. In the middle we used words like 'Next', 'After that' or 'Later'. At the end of the story we used 'In the end', 'Eventually' and 'Finally'.



We have been learning numbers up to 10 in Maths. We use a counter (a Rekenrek) and different number squares and double sided counters. We have been finding missing numbers with our adding, and using the 'more than', 'less than' and 'equal to' signs when comparing numbers.

Our topic this term is called, 'An Island Home'. We have been comparing life in Chichester to everyday life on small islands, looking at the Isle of Wight and Cuba. We learnt all about smugglers and we got the chance to hold and smell tea, coffee and spices that were smuggled into Chichester by the famous Hawkhurst Gang many years ago. We drew island maps on coffeestained paper. We even learnt the names of some famous pirates!

In history we have been learning about Grace Darling. We painted pictures of the stormy night and wrote information plaques to tell others of her bravery. Grace went out in her row boat, with her father, to rescue people from the water. We learnt how to mix tints and shades of blue to paint a rough sea and black silhouette stencils for the lighthouse, rocks and row boat.

We all agreed that Creative Week (the first week after half term) was lots of fun. We made 3D space pictures and enjoyed learning about Bob and his alien friends.

Money, Money, Money! We have been learning to recognize the value of different coins and notes, making amounts by selecting coins and finding totals. We have played lots of money games, including ones on the computer.

There was a big cheer in our classroom this week because our Rekenreks finally arrived! So far we have been using our fingers, double-sided counters and number-frames to help us learn number bonds. We can now use the beads on the Rekenreks to swipe and see numbers. Mrs Saunders is always saying, Don't count see the amount! Happy Christmas Everyone!

This half term, we have loved learning all about the Tudors. We learnt so much when we were visited by Paul Ullson. My favourite part was sketching Tudor mugs, which were made from things like hand stitched leather to shiny pottery jugs. We have also been writing about the Tudors, and this has been one of our favourite things. We have really focussed upon using expanded noun phrases to add more description into our writing.

In Computing, we have been working upon our own comic strips using a range of IT skills that Mr Neaves has been showing us. We are all really proud of our comics strips.



In Science, we have been learning about sound and how it travels through the air and into the ear. We have learnt how sound travels in waves and that it travels down your ear canal, hitting the ear drum and, in turn, moving the 3 smallest bones in your body. We have also been looking at the festival of Diwali in R.E. This is the festival of light. During Diwali, stories are told of Rama and Sita, We have looked at the story and focussed upon the different characters included. It has been very interesting to learn.

Fishbourne Roman Palace

On Friday 29th November, Year 5 class of JYS went to Fishbourne Roman Palace for a school trip.

Firstly, we walked from school to the palace. When we got there, we met Charlie (who was leading us) and she took us to a room to watch a short film about how the Roman Palace was destroyed.

We then walked over the the palace. Once inside, we had a workshop with a range of activities to do such as; making mosaics - actually using 2000 year-old pieces, categorising Roman artefacts and writing our names in Latin on a wax board - just as the Roman's would have done!

Our second activity was tasting Roman food. We all had to face a red curtain. When Charlie pulled back the curtain we were faced with all sorts of Roman foods. We were shown a replica of a Roman kitchen with actual tools that would have been used. We then tasted the food, including things such as seasoned cheese, olives with spices, seasoned carrots, dried apple and Roman bread. The cheese was so good that people went for seconds.

After having our lunch, we took part in a clay modelling workshop looking at the different gods the Romans worshipped and we got to make model tokens that the Romans would have used in worship.

Before returning home, we checked out the mosaics and the garden. It looked more like a maze with funky trees and hedges.

#SantaDash (10/12/21)



We won 1-0, 2-0, 2-1, 5-0!



Christmas book recommendations:



Key Stage 1: "The Christmasaurus" is a story about a boy and a dinosaur called the Christmasaurus. They meet one Christmas Eve and have a magical adventure. This book is about friendship and families, sleigh bells and Santa, singing elves and flying reindeer, music and magic. It's about discovering your heart's true desire, and learning that the impossible might just be possible.



Key Stage 2: This hilarious book is a festive favourite! A Boy Called Christmas tells the story of Nikolas, whose father has disappeared on a dangerous expedition to find Santa's elves. Nikolas sets out to the Far North to rescue his father. encountering danger, new friends and a good deal of Christmas magic along the way. Eventually Nikolas finds that he has his very own part to play in bringing festive joy to many others.


